
As we look forward to building on these successes in the new year, we want to wish everyone a safe and happy holiday season!

The creature is on top of Lynn, trying to bite into her neck. Billy swings the sword at Mogwai, neatly beheading it. The head rolls into the fireplace, burning to a crisp. 168. SUDDENLY, A GIGGLE IS HEARD. 168. Billy turns to the direction of the sound. 169. 169. ONE REMAINING CREATURE stands on a windowsill, across the room from Billy. Billy recognizes the creature. It's STRIPE. The exact, white lightning like stripe runs across its newly formed face and torso. Stripe glares and hisses at Billy. Billy raises his sword to kill the creature. Stripe thinks fast and smashes through the window, escaping into the night.
